IN THE

AAF, PACIFIC OCEAN AREAS, WESTERN PACIFIC (Delayed) -Two men from Salem, Ore., Staff Sgt. Emmel Gilmer and Sgt. Marvin D. Hageman, members of a P-47 fighter squadron, have been commended officially for combat action with their 7th AAF assault unit, which landed on Salpan during the Marianas campaign.

The commendation, from Maj. John J. Hussey, squadron commanding officer, states:

"Despite enemy bombing, strafing, shelling and both sniping and infiltration raids by Japanese armed groups, they worked day and night, untiringly and uncomplainingly, to pave the way for the arrival of our P-47 Thunderbolt fighter planes and to insure efficient operation during the days of combat to follow."
