

5 Benedictines To Be Honored

Archbishop Howard to Confer Diaconate On Men of Order

MT. ANGEL—Friday, December 8, the feast of the Immaculate Conception, will be a day of celebration at St. Benedict's abbey. The Most Rev. Edward D. Howard, archbishop of Portland, will be at Mt. Angel to officiate at both morning and afternoon services.

During the solemn pontifical high mass in the abbey chapel at 8 a. m., the archbishop will confer the orders of diaconate on five fraters and the order of subdiaconate on three fraters.

Those to be made deacons are Rev. Fraters Dominic Broxmeyer, OSB; Louis Charvet, OSB; Raymond Geade, OSB; Bertrand Trautman, OSB; Eugene Kenenbenz, OSB. The first three are members of the local abbey and the other two are from the St. Martin's Benedictine abbey at Lacey, Wash.

The three who are to be raised to subdeacons are the Rev. Fraters Michael Feeney, OSB and Felix Wirth, OSB of St. Martin's and Rev. Frater Peter Houck, OSB, of Mt. Angel. The archbishop will also confer minor orders on Joseph Heretick.

At noon Archbishop Howard, Rt. Rev. Abbott Thomas Meier of St. Benedict's abbey and the directors of the seminary will be special guests at a banquet in the seminary refectory.

The solemn reception of new members into the seminarians' sodality of the Blessed Virgin will highlight the afternoon's activities. The archbishop will solemnly receive the candidates and install the new officers of the sodality.

The traditional crad party for the members of the community will finish off the festive day.

They solicit for the credit of sales of bonds wherever they can. It is not confined to school children alone. The losing group is pledged to treat the winning group.

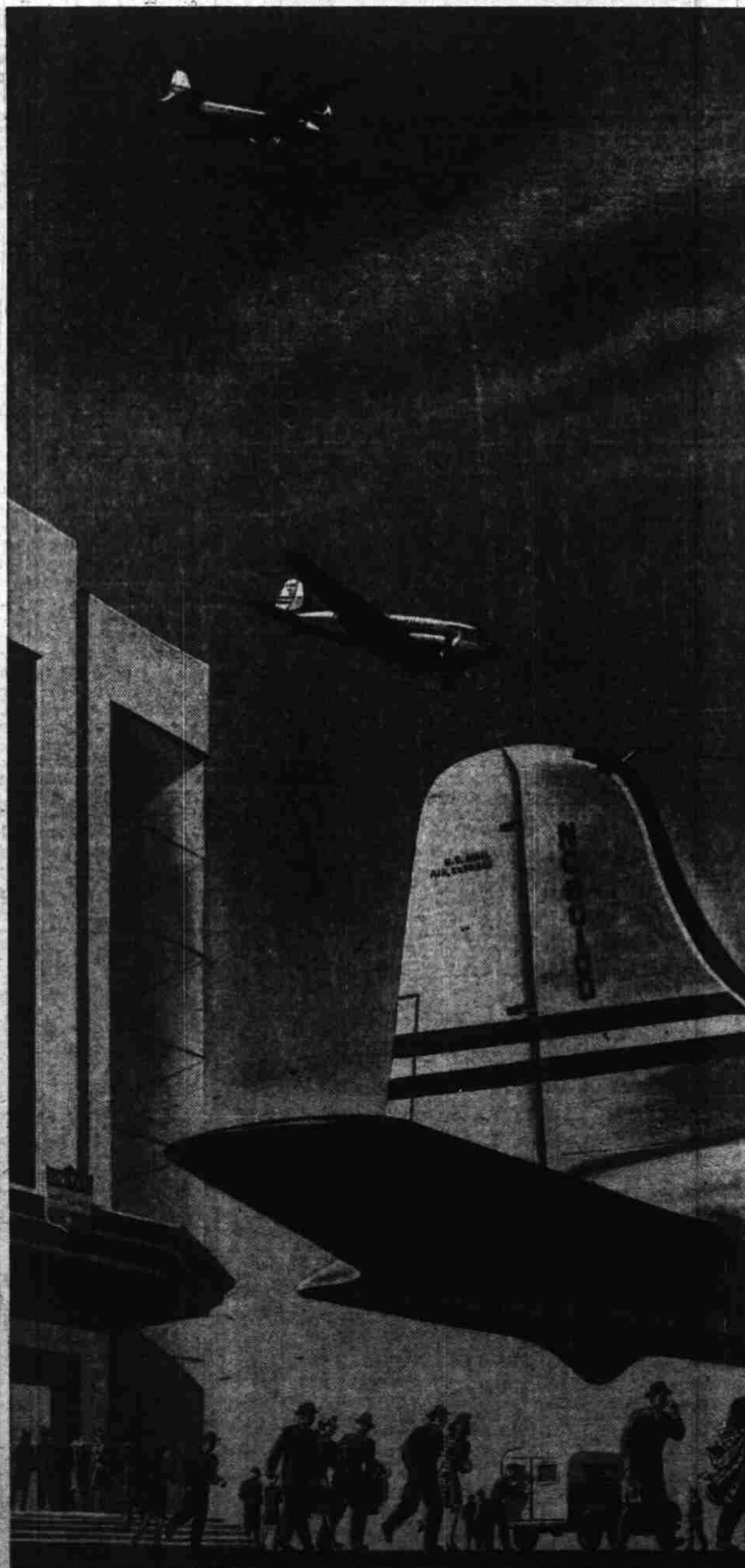
Reception Given For Cpl. Baker
