Double Duty

Ideas Come for Housewife Through The Mail but Help Scrap Drive too

We contribute generously to the waste paper drive each day, when we open a stack of mail and consign practically all of it to the wastebasket, for use in the war effort. Today our first mail, we found, weighed exactly one pound and eight ounces, certainly a generous gift to the old paper dealer.

Some of the envelopes we open, many of them we cast aside, knowing they are merely "guff."

Today's pound and a half yielded the following ideas:

The western states will be temporarily excluded from the government order which freezes all the chickens sold for meat during the next few months. Eastern producers will be expected to supply the quartermaster corps' shortage of 110 million pounds.

Most of the big potatoes in the western markets have been taken by the army, thus homemakers will have to get by with small potatoes, (and according to our observation, with rather poor ones at that.) The government says to "boil 'em in their jackets and then do anything you wish them."

Acid reddens red cabbage, alkali turns it blue or green. By serving the red vegetable raw with acid dressing, it retains its color. Cooking in hard water it usually loses color. It is best to cook it in milk unless water is acidulated.

A good way, the bulletin says, is to cook cabbage with apple, which furnishes both acid and a good flavor. Cutting red cabbage with knives which have been washed in soap sometimes discolors the cut edges.

A recipe for a confection that takes comparatively little sugar is listed. Now that figs are seen in most markets, it's a practical recipe:

ALMOND FIG CANDY
1 1/2 cups dried white figs
2 cups granulated sugar
1/2 cup dark corn syrup
1/2 cup milk
1/4 cup butter
1/4 cup peanut butter
1/4 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon vanilla extract
1/2 cup chopped roasted unblanched almonds

Boil figs 5 minutes, drain, clip stems and chop figs. Combine sugar with corn syrup, milk, butter, peanut butter and salt, and boil to 238 degrees F. (soft ball when tested in cold water). Beat until creamy, add flavoring and figs, and stir to blend. Pour one-half the mixture into greased pan. When set, cut into squares. To other half, add almonds, and shape into a roll. When set, slice.

Here's a final household item of interest:

Before using any of the drain cleaners on the market, the housewife should understand the action of the lye in these preparations. Soda lye combines with grease to form hard soap. Potash lye forms soft soap. Many drain cleaners are made with soda lye because it is cheaper and easier to obtain than potash lye. If

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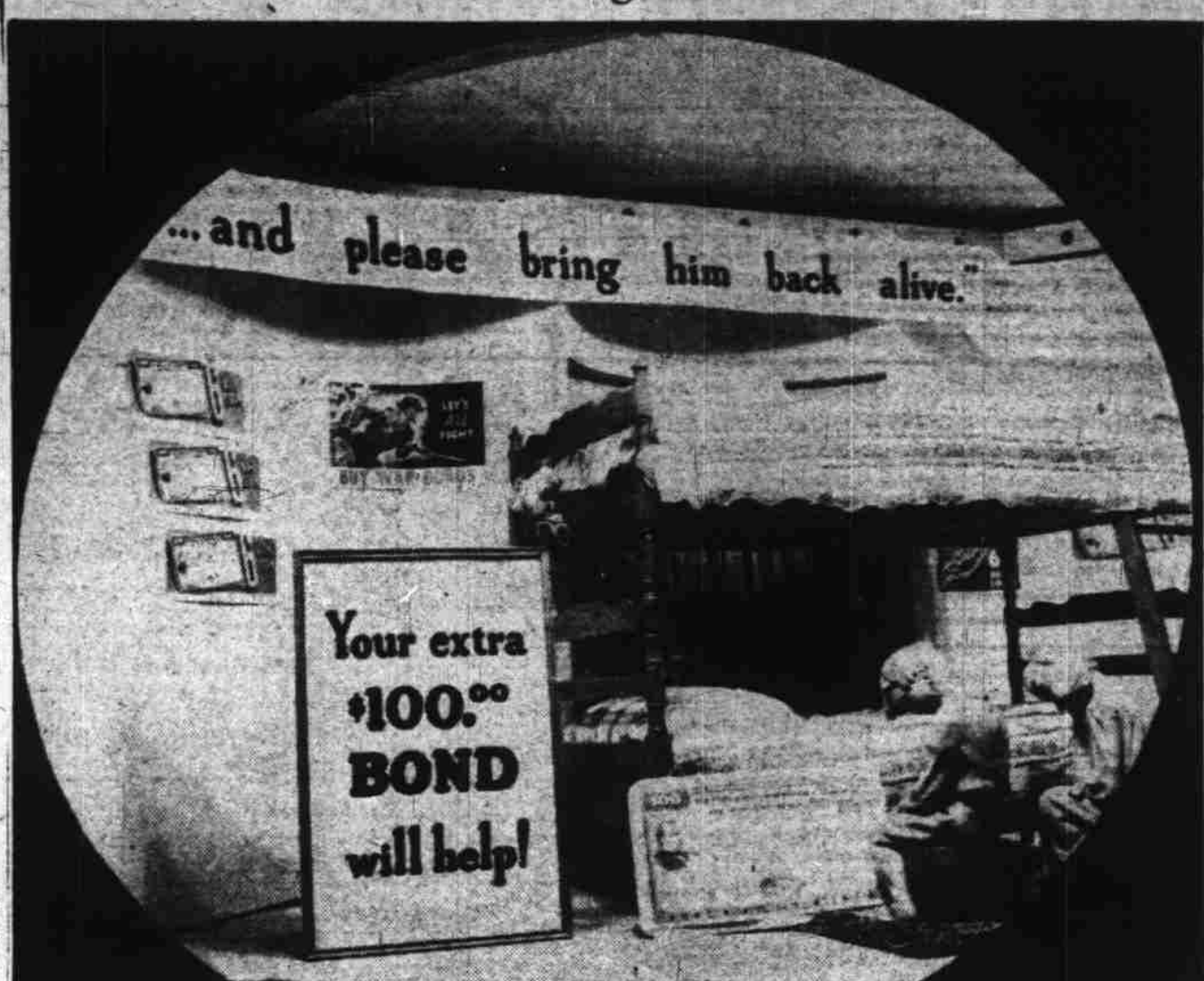
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"Heartstrings Window"

GLAZED CARROTS

1 bunch carrots
1/2 cup brown sugar
4 tablespoons butter
1/4 cup-hot water

Cook scraped, halved carrots until just tender in a small amount of water. Cook sugar, water and butter for five minutes, stirring until sugar is dissolved. Place carrots in baking dish, pour syrup over them, and bake at 375 degrees for 20 minutes, basting frequently.

90,000 Applications for Car Stickers Received

Approximately 90,000 applications for 1945 motor vehicle registration stickers had been received at the state department here up to late Monday or only 914 more than during the same period in 1944.

A few more than 75,000 stickers already have been placed in the mails and others will be sent out as fast as they are processed. Officials predicted that 440,000 automobiles would be registered in 1945.



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
