

Patricia Lamb Bride of Warren Doolittle at Church Ceremony

In one of the most impressive ceremonies of the winter season Miss Patricia June Lamb, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Marvin Lamb, exchanged her wedding vows Tuesday night at the First Congregational church with Mr. Warren Lee Doolittle, seaman first class, United States coast guard, son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Doolittle.

It was at 8 o'clock that Rev. David Nielsen performed the rites. Before the bridal party entered Miss Beth Siewert sang "The Lord's Prayer" and "At Dawning." Mrs. W. H. East played the organ accompaniments and wedding marches.

At the chancel rail were baskets of gold and white chrysanthemums with similar bouquets and greenery arranged at the altar. The pews were marked with clusters of chrysanthemums tied with white satin ribbon. Many tall white candles at the altar and in the windows cast a soft glow in the sanctuary. Mrs. H. William McElhinny and Miss Roberta Jean Yocom lighted the tapers. They wore pink and blue frocks and had wrist corsages of yellow and white chrysanthemums.

Bride Wears White

The brunette bride made a beautiful picture in her white silk jersey gown as she approached the altar on the arm of her father. Her handsome gown was fashioned with a gathered skirt over a full, ruffled taffeta slip, the skirt ending in a court train. The bodice was made with a low waist and long sleeves which ended in points over each wrist. The high, rounded neckline was enhanced with a wide yoke of fine net embellished with two narrow bands of the Jersey.
