# First 10 Days Of December Just Average

December is turning out to be just another "average month" this year as far as temperatures are concerned, according to reports for the first 10 days of the month from the Salem weather bureau. Average mean temperature for the period this year is 44 degrees, compared with an average mean temperature for the past six years of 45 degrees and an average of 41 degrees for the past 49 years. Average maximum temperature this year for this same period is 52, the same as the average maximum for the past six years. Average minimum has been 36, a little colder than the average for the past six years of 38 degrees. The warmest 10-day period in the past six years was in 1939 when the temperature mean was 49 degrees.

Precipitation for the first 10 days of December, 1944 is .73 inches rainfall, making this period the second driest in the past six years, as in 1940 only .64 inches rainfall was registered. Average rainfall for the same period is 2.83 inches.
