## Father, Soldier Son Each Minus Leg, Mother Falls, Breaks Arm

SILVERTON, Dec. 12.—That all the people who deserve medals are not in the armed forces, was the opinion of Silvertown folk Sunday when they heard Mrs. J. P. Rankin remark, "It could have been worse."

Mrs. Rankin fell late Saturday night and broke her right arm. At first she had feared her hip was broken because it was badly bruised and gave her some pain.

Two years ago Mr. Rankin had one foot removed. In June of this year he lost his other leg. Then word came that their son, Kenneth, had lost a leg in battle in Italy. He is expected home Friday of this week for the first time. Since his return to the states early this fall he has been hospitalized in Utah. Mrs. Rankin is busy preparing for his homecoming when she slipped on her husband's wheel chair runway.

"But," she insists "it still could have been worse. At least we'll all be together at Christmas, and that's a lot."
