CLEVELAND, Ohio, Dec. 12.—(Special)—Lt. William E. Dougherty, assistant attorney general of Oregon in 1942, has been assigned to the Cleveland ordnance district of the army service forces.

A member of the army service forces since 1942, he was promoted to first lieutenant Aug. 22, 1944. He attended high school in Medford and the University of Oregon, Stanford university and Southern Oregon college of education. Sgt. Cyril Suing Wins Air Medal

AN EIGHTH AIR FORCE BOMBER STATION, England—Sgt. Cyril R. Suing of Salem, 21-year-old ball turret gunner on the crew of a B-17 Flying Fortress, has recently been awarded the Air Medal. He won the decoration for "meritorious achievement" while participating in heavy bombardment missions in the eighth air force offensive against the enemy over continental Europe.

Before entering the army air forces in May, 1943, he was employed by the Boeing Aircraft Co. of Seattle, as a mechanic. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. C. A. Suing of 1045 N. Church street, Salem.

The gunner won his wings at Las Vegas gunnery school in March, 1944. He is now a member of the 486th bombardment group, a unit of the third bombardment division, the division cited by the president for its historic shuttle bombing of the Messerschmitt plant at Regensburg, Germany.

Sgt. David McRae Wins Air Medal

Combat Infantry Badge Awarded to Maynard Hoffman

WITH THE AMERICAN DIVISION SOMEWHERE IN THE SOUTHWEST PACIFIC—For his performance of duty in action against the enemy on Bougainville, Staff Sgt. Maynard A. Hoffman, 521 West Piedmont avenue, Salem, Ore., son of Mrs. Elizabeth Hoffman, has been awarded the Combat Infantryman badge.

Overseas six months, Hoffman is with front line troops of the American division. As the first army unit to engage the Japanese offensively, the division fought on Guadalcanal until the island was secured in February, 1943.

On Bougainville, Hoffman's regiment distinguished itself in the bloody battle for Hill 260, where 541 Japs were killed in a fanatical attack on the American perimeter.

Commanded by Brig. Gen. William H. Arnold, of St. Louis, Mo., the "Americal" is the only combat division in the United States army having a name instead of a number.

Hoffman, a section leader, also holds the Good Conduct medal and wears one battle star on his Asiatic-Pacific ribbon.

Sergeant Saunders Is Mobile Unit Chief For Honored Squadron

15th AAF IN ITALY—Tech. Sgt. T/S Reginald E. Saunders, son of Mr. and Mrs. D. A. Saunders of Salem, Ore., is a mobile unit chief in a service squadron attached to the AAF's oldest fighter group, which has been awarded a presidential citation and two war department citations.

Sergeant Saunders' squadron has served the veteran fighter group through the campaigns of Sicily, Italy and Southern France.

The original citation was for a strafing attack on an airfield at Foggia, Italy, before the Salerno landing. The group's fighter pilots destroyed 36 enemy planes and damaged 52 others in the first such long-range, low-level strafing attacks in strength.

An oak leaf cluster was added for an escort mission over enemy rail yards at Aversa, Italy, and the second cluster was for a withdrawal cover mission in support of heavy bomber attack on the Roanmo American oil refineries at Ploesti, Rumania.

Sgt. Manuel Hadley Awarded Air Medal For Bomber Work

Staff Sgt. Manuel C. Hadley, son of Mr. and Mrs. Quillin A. Hadley, Salem, has been awarded the air medal for meritorious achievement while participating in sustained bomber combat operations over enemy occupied territory in the European theatre of operations.

"The courage, coolness and skill" displayed by Sergeant Hadley, "reflect great credit upon himself and the armed forces of the United States," his citation said.

Staff Sgt. Hadley has been overseas seven months and is a gunner on a B-17 of the eighth air force.

FORT SILL, Okla., Dec. 11.—(FAS)—Capt. Ezra S. Webb, New Vernon, N.J., has been enrolled as a student in the officer advanced course at the field artillery school, Fort Sill, Okla. Turkey's Kick Not Cancer's Cause, Ruled

The state industrial accident commission prevailed in a state supreme court decision here Tuesday involving suit brought by Ann S. Landauer, who sought an award from the commission on the grounds that she had developed a cancer from being kicked by a turkey as she worked for the Northwest Poultry and Dairy Products.

The opinion, written by Justice Percy Kelly, upheld Circuit Judge Arlie Walker, Yamhill and Polk counties, who held against the plaintiff. Justice Kelly held the claim invalid because it was not filed within the statutory three months period after the accident and because she failed to prove that the injury resulted from an accident on the job.

The woman alleged that she suffered the accident on December 1, 1942, but that the cancer was not diagnosed until seven months later.

Other decisions Tuesday: G. K. McMillen, administrator of the estate of Warren Stevens, deceased, appellant, vs. Rogers and Barnett. Appeal from Umatilla county. Suit to recover damages for personal injuries. Opinion by Justice J. O. Bailey. Judge C. L. Sweet, affirmed.

Wheat Ceiling Up 4 Cents

WASHINGTON, Dec. 12.—(AP)—An increase of four cents a bushel in the ceiling price of wheat was announced tonight by the office of price administration. It is effective tomorrow.

The increase, the agency said, is necessary to fulfill the requirements of the stabilization act of 1944.

The prices established by this amendment are calculated to reflect parity to producers.

The increase affects all levels of distribution.

The price of bread, however, is not affected by the action, OPA said.

Flour ceilings remain unchanged and no change will be necessary because of a flour production subsidy payment of 19 cents a bushel. This payment will remain unchanged until Dec. 31 and a new rate for January, based on wheat prices under the new ceilings, will be announced later this month.

Grain Futures Remain Firm

CHICAGO, Dec. 12.—(AP)—Grain future markets were generally firm today, with December wheat strong most of the session. The nearby contract was nearly a cent above yesterday's close and held close to that figure at the finish, although reaction carried away the gain of the distant contracts. There was no great pressure on the market.

There was no confirmation of cash corn sales at ceiling prices, and offerings in the cash market were small.

Rye was unsettled within a fair range, and there was some early buying in sympathy with wheat and corn, but commission houses sold toward the close and the market reacted.

Oats prices were within narrow limits, with commission houses on both sides of the market. There was scattered liquidation in the December contract.

Barley was dull and steady. At the close wheat was 1/4 lower to 1/2 higher than yesterday's close, December \$1.69 1/2. Corn was 1/4 lower to 1/2 higher, December \$1.15. Oats were 1/4 lower to 1/2 higher, December 70 1/2.

Cannery Union Meets Here

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Stock Average Falls at Last

NEW YORK, Dec. 12.—(AP)—The stock market average gave ground today after eight successive advancing sessions—to 7-year highs—longest sustained upswing since last March—although scattered strong spots persisted and initial losses running to a point or more were eventually reduced in the majority of cases.

Caution, more than a revival of bearishness, inspired the trimming of accounts at the opening on the idea the lengthy forward push called for a sizeable technical correction.

The Associated Press 60-stock composite was off .1 of a point at 97.4 for the first time since Nov. 30. Of 921 issues registering, 409 were lower, 300 higher and 212 unchanged. Transfers totaled 1,154,940 shares compared with 1,502,350 the day before.

Contesting the trend at tops for 1944 or longer were Illinois Central, Northern Pacific and Magna Copper. The last named still reflected reports of new Arizona mining discoveries.
