## Corporal Michael Assigned to B-17 Fortress Group

15TH AAF IN ITALY — Cpl. Jimmy L. Michael, 19, 150 Highway avenue, Salem, Ore., ball turret gunner, has been assigned recently to an AAF B-17 Flying Fortress unit of the 15th air force.

Corporal Michael, who in civilian life was an electrician, joined the army on Jan. 3, 1943, and received his gunner's wings in May, 1944, at Las Vegas, Nev.

He attended the Payette high school (Idaho) and was employed by the Oregon shipyards, Portland. His parents are Mr. and Mrs. G. L. Michael, Salem.

Sgt. Richard H. Laws, son of Mr. and Mrs. L. L. Laws of route four, Salem, was wounded in Italy early this fall, is spending a 30-day furlough from Barnes hospital with his parents.

Laws, a graduate of Salem high school and a former student at both Oregon State college and the University of Oregon, had been overseas for 27 months when an enemy bullet passed through his neck cracking a vertebrae in action north of Pisa. He was flown from a hospital in Italy to New York early in November and from New York to Barnes hospital, Vancouver, Wash.

Samuel McKee, pharmacist 2/c United States navy, is home on leave after 21 months of service in the south Pacific. He is visiting at the home of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. S. E. McKee, 960 Jefferson street. He will be here 30 days and report to Treasure Island. McKee has been in the service three years.

## Ammonium Nitrate Good Investment; Advise Ordering Now

Three to four dollars worth of pasture may be expected from each dollar spent for ammonium nitrate used for top dressing permanent pastures. Fifty to 75 pounds per acre applied in February and repeated in April make an enormous increase in pasture production and lengthens the pasture season by four to six weeks. Ammonium nitrate is available from all fertilizer dealers on order, but the supply is insufficient for meeting all needs. Supplies should be ordered immediately.

Lamb, 11 1/2 to 12 1/2 (steady); sheep, 3 to 4 cents (steady); veal, 12 to 13 cents (steady); cow, beef type, 7 1/2 to 9 (steady); cow, dairy type, 4 to 7 1/2 (steady); hogs, 160 to 240, \$15.45 (up); 240 to 270 weight, \$14.70 (up); sows, 12 to 13 cents, (steady).

The supply of hogs is now short but supplies of all other animals are reported as normal.

## Credit Closing Date Has Been Extended

To help Oregon farmers in marketing the unusually large crop of sudan grass seed produced this year, Commodity Credit has extended the closing date of the hay and pasture seed loan program. The extension, made at the request of the AAA committee, gives producers until February 1, 1945, to complete loan papers, providing application for the loans is made to the county committee before January 1. The loan rate on common seed is six cents a pound.

That new poultry buildings would be unsound expansion under present conditions is the opinion of the state AAA committee.

In view of the tight lumber situation and considering that Oregon 1945 poultry goals call for reducing the number of laying hens and for holding chickens and turkeys raised at about the level of the 1944 output, the state committee has instructed county committees to give careful consideration before approving applications for constructing additional poultry facilities.
