of self assurance, faith and intelligence. This quality has more than once gleamed out of the night that covers us. Yes, Salem was a wonderful city, and must be made even more wonderful. If the world at home ponders the postwar scene, so even more the troops, the sailors and the marines ponder it. "First," say they, "let's get home. Then let's return to the

unfinished job of building the mighty west." It was said in neer days, "Give me men to match my mountains." Well, the men have more than matched them, they have moved them in the eternal search for the good life. Following this war must move more mountains in that relentless struggle if neces-

No, we don't care so much for helicopters and electronic frying nans and television - these are only cherries atop the sundae. What we - and we're sure you, too - want most is a return to steady progress, a return to development of the nobility of man. This cannot be achieved by grinning at the current magazine advertisements or by pushing buttons. This can be achieved only by a new sort of concerted effort, a new sort of comradeship, and a universal wish to better our lives and our city's future. Perhaps we sound a bit vague.

Perhaps, you feel, we have merely set the stage for another fantastic dream-another New York advertisement - but in this article we promise the promotion of a feasible, sensible and necessary addition to the set of institutions which evolve Salem the dream town in many a GI's heart. How can we achieve this

aforementioned unification? How can we knit ourselves together in a project more useful only to our children than to us? Here we have a plan. What if the city as a whole was to awaken and wonder over

a few existent problems and ask: Why are our children growing farther away from their parents? Why can't we instill in them the dream of the good life? Why have schools lost touch with parents, the church with youth, the student with the working for the same ideals and yet they meet in the child much like three radio stations meeting on the same frequency, To wonder at this loss of unification is not enough, when this lost quality can be regained.

Let us consider the possibility here set forth by a group from the Salem high school class of 1942 - our last year in cords and loud sweaters and bow ties. We believe that at one time Salem entertained the idea of constructing a civic center and it was an amplification of this idea that started us. Suppose such a structure was erected-a unifying center where parents, children, teachers and ministers could meet, work and play together along coordinated lines. How many postwar problems would be eradicated if there was such a place where these four could mingle, study and produce How could the various insti-

tutions of our area fit into the picture? First of all there is the city schools. The center could afford outlet for all children in all age groups of our school knowledge, appreciation and self expression through art, music, drama, public speaking, sociology and political science. Its facilities could be trained toward

Second, and equally important a successor is secured.

as a group, would be the council of churches. To them the center would provide a gateway to the local youth and a means at preventing the current eclipse of the Cross. Third, we would list the specialty schools of the area dealing in painting, ballet, mod-ern dance, writing, and orchestral arts. These groups could use the center as a groving ground for their students and as a showcase recital hall. Fourth, we will list the special service groups, community concert association, civic organizations and local art groups, all of whom could fit in with excellent ad-

pay for itself largely. So there, people of Salem, you
