Spaghetti will be combined with veal to make an excellent main course in one dish. A vegetable salad bowl will begin the meal.

Vegetable salad bowl
Veal and spaghetti
Buttered toasted buns
Brownies, fruit

VEAL 'N' SPAGHETTI
3 pounds veal round slices, ¾ to 1 inch thick
¼ pound salt pork
3 large cloves garlic
2 medium onions
2 No. 1½ cans tomato paste
1 No. 2½ can tomatoes
1 No. 2 can button mushrooms
1 hot red pepper
1 tablespoon salt
1 teaspoon pepper
1 pound spaghetti
Cut veal round slices into 2-inch pieces. Dice salt pork and brown with garlic. Mash out as much juice and pulp as possible from the garlic and remove the cloves. Brown the meat in the same fat. Chop onions and add with remaining ingredients to meat. Cover and simmer 2-2½ hours. Cook spaghetti in a large kettle of boiling salted water until tender. Drain. Serve meat sauce over spaghetti. Serves 8 generously.
