- 11 large onions
1 cup sausage meat
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 cup cracker crumbs (16)
1/2 cup chopped celery
Peel onions, parboil in salt water for 15 minutes. Cut slices off for tops; remove centers, leaving 1/2-inch shells. Cook sausage meat 3 minutes in frying pan and mix with chopped onion centers and remaining ingredients. Stuff onions, cover with tops, and sprinkle with buttered crumbs, and bake in moderate oven (375 degrees F. for 30 minutes.
