Oregon Typical in Methods Of Taxation Says Speaker

Taxes are typical in Oregon, the state using nine of the 10 chief sources of taxation used generally by other states, F. H. Young, president of the Oregon Business and Tax Bureau of Portland, told members of the Salem Board of Realtors at their noonday meeting Friday in Marion hotel.

The suggestion now being considered by the state legislature, at the instance of the governor, for retention of a firm of tax experts to analyze the state's tax structure, poses a problem, the speaker said.

Naming alcoholic beverages, death or inheritance, insurance premiums, motor vehicle, property, tobacco, utility, franchise, income and gasoline taxes as the chief sources of income in most states, Young pointed out that all are taxed in Oregon with the single exception of tobacco.

Voters Decide—Young also pointed out that Oregon is the only state in the union which does not give its legislators the last word in taxation. Because voters consistently beat down new forms of taxation which they do not like, he pointed out, an obstacle is created hindering a change.

He named possible alternative sources of revenue to which the state has access. These are used in some other states and include a tax on soft drinks, admission and amusements, racing, stock markets, chain stores, poll tax, general license tax, severance tax, sales tax and tax on oleomargarine.

Beats Sales Tax—"The state has beaten the sales tax," he said, "and we have no racing, no stock markets, are against severance tax on our timber because of the competition it will get after the war from plastics. Chain store taxes produce little. The people are fed up with luxury taxes. But if we are to get new tax money it must come from a tax on this last group. Oregon voters won't support these changes. The speaker said much money could be saved through consolidation of school districts and adoption of the county manager plan. "Better budgeting," he said, "will save money."

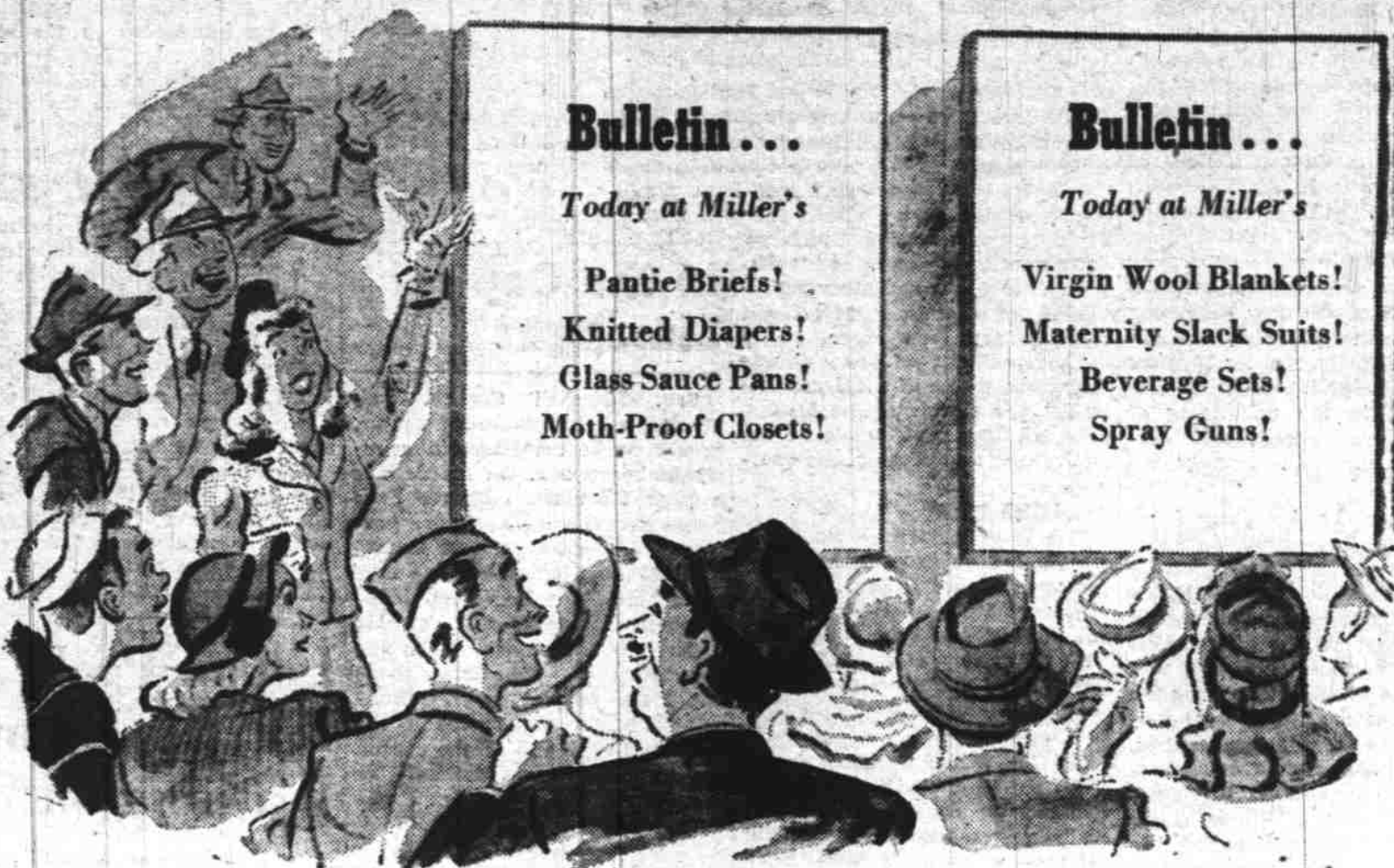
