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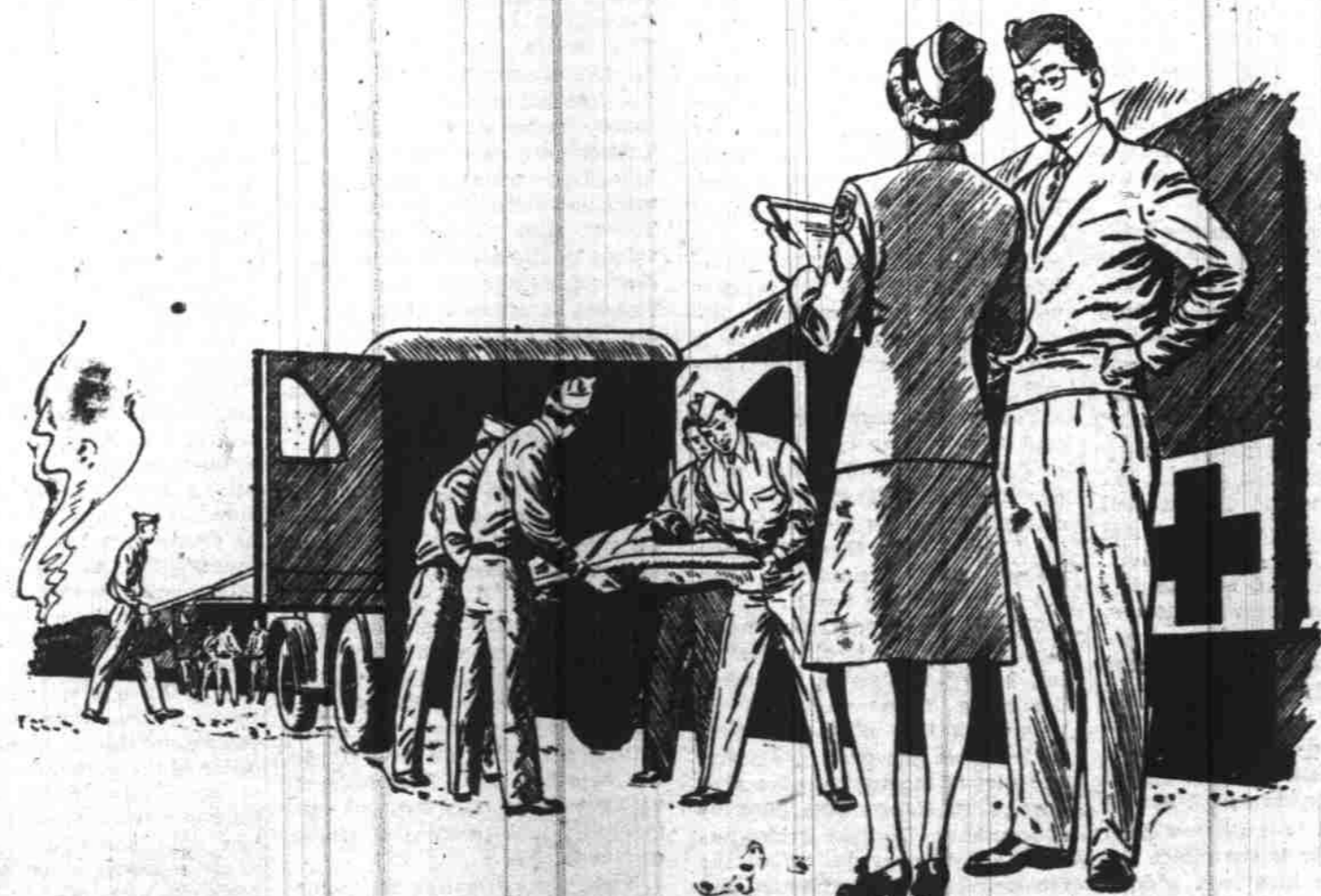
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Please think twice before you put this message out-of-mind
