

### Court Holds Paper Carrier As Employee

The state supreme court, in a 6 to 1 decision, Tuesday held that a rural carrier as an employee for the Oregon Journal was subject to the unemployment compensation laws rather than an independent contractor.

The carrier involved in the proceeding is James R. Johnston, who had contracts to deliver papers to Benton and Linn county subscribers and to pay the Journal for his papers.

The Oregonian has a similar case pending.

The majority opinion, written by Justice Hall S. Luak, affirmed Circuit Judge L. G. Lewelling of Benton county.

Justice George Rosman, in a dissenting opinion, said Johnston was a contractor and that his compensation was unwarranted.

### Farrell Distributes \$41,980 in State Funds

Distribution of two funds, totaling \$41,980.31, was announced today by Secretary of State Robert S. Farrell, jr.

One fund of \$15,000, representing revenue derived from the state amusement device tax, was apportioned on the basis of 60 per cent, to the state public assistance fund; and 40 per cent to the 38 counties in the state.

The second fund, totaling \$26,980.31 and representing monies received from the federal government under the Taylor grazing act, was distributed to the following 12 counties: Baker, Crook, Deschutes, Gilliam, Grant, Harney, Klamath, Lake, Malheur, Morrow, Sherman and Umatilla.
