My unit was dug in while our artillery was pounding the enemy in preparation for an attack," Corporal Wolf said. "In an enemy exchange of fire, I was wounded by fragments from an enemy 155 mm shell which burst nearby. I walked to the battalion aid station

Corporal Wolf's wife resides at 8405 Southeast 65th ave., Portland. One brother, Dwight E. Wolf, is a chief petty officer in the navy. Another brother, Donald B. Wolf, is in the U.S. maritime service.


