- SCALLOPED OYSTERS 2 dozen large oysters 5 cups coarsely crumbled crackers
- 1/4 teaspoon salt 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- 1 cup oyster liquor and milk 1 teaspoon grated onion

1/4 cup butter or substitute Drain oysters, reserving liquid, add top milk to make one cup. Arrange one third of crumbs in greased 2-quart casserole, place half oysters on top, sprinkle with salt and pepper, repeat and top with remaining crumbs. Heat liquor and mik, onion and butter until latter is melted. Pour over oyster mixture and bake in moderate oven at 350 degrees for 35 minutes. This serves 6.

SEA FOOD RAREBIT

- 11/2 cups water 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 lb. shrimp or crab meat 1 dozen oysters

- 3 tablespoons fat 4 tablespoons flour
- % cup grated cheese Salt and pepper
- 24 crackers

Drain oysters, reserving liquid. Melt fat in saucepan. Stir in flour. Gradually add fish liquor with enough milk to make 3 cups. Cook until thick and smooth. Add cheese and stir until melted. Season. Add fish, heat thoroughly and serve on crackers. Serves 6 or more.


