Polk County PTA Meeting Held

INDEPENDENCE — About 50 were in attendance at the all-day meeting of the Polk county council of Parent-Teachers on Wednesday, held at the West Salem grade school. Associations represented were from Dallas, Falls City, Monmouth, Independence and West Salem.

At the morning business session, presided over by Mrs. Fletcher Barrows of Monmouth, president, a school of instruction was given by Mrs. J. H. Turnbull of Salem, regional vice-president. She talked on the objectives of Parent-Teacher work.

Discussions were given on bills of interest to Parent-Teachers now before the legislature. The association was urged to support the plan now before the ways and means committee for \$23,000 to be allowed for research on child nutrition. They were urged also to support house bill No. 53, which will provide a health and physical fitness program in high schools. The support of the milk control bill was also urged and the bill to be drawn asking the state to provide funds for a school lunch supervisor in the department of education.

Luncheon was served by West Salem Parent-Teacher association as hostesses and the teachers of the grade school as guests. Mrs. Van Zanten, principal of the grade school, presented a group of students in a music program, followed by a talk by Katherine Haskell Read, assistant professor of household administration at Oregon State college. She spoke on "How can home and school help develop more tolerance and friendliness in children." She stated that children should be taught to find outlets for negative emotions and that parents must learn to understand and accept emotions of their children.

The nominating committee elected to report at the next meeting to be held at Dallas on April 5 includes Mrs. Dean Walker, chairman, Mrs. Norman Hanna and Mrs. Hugh Van Loan of Monmouth.

VEAL STEAK PAPIRIKA STYLE
1 lbs. veal steak (1/2 inch thick)
Salt
1 egg
2 tablespoons milk
1 cup sifted bread crumbs
Drippings or fat
1 cup sour cream
1 tablespoon paprika
Cut steak into six pieces. Season and dip in beaten egg diluted with milk, then into sifted crumbs. Brown slowly in hot fat. Add sour cream. Cover and cook slowly one hour. Add paprika and blend well. Serve steak tipped with sauce, on a very hot platter. Yield: six servings.
