Combine all ingredients and mix well. Make into balls about 1 inch in diameter. Brown on all sides in lard or drippings. Cover frying-pan and cook slowly for 20 minutes. Top with tomato sauce and serve with spaghetti.

Lebanon Park Survey Asked

Memorial Building to Be Included in City Postwar Aims

LEBANON — The city council has been commended for the action taken at their last meeting when they voted to have Oregon College engineers make a survey of the property bought five years ago for park purposes. This square in the center of the east side residential district has been suggested as the proper place for the proposed veterans' memorial building which the local legion post is sponsoring. This survey would be the first step in long range planning for use of the tract for a center of recreational facilities.

The veterans' memorial building is the only concrete proposal for such a recreational center, for which funds will be raised. A number of other recreational projects, playgrounds, tennis courts and swimming pool, have been discussed. By having this city property surveyed and a plan drawn up, the site can be made use of for projects that will take a number of years to complete and still not have an unsightly disorderly appearance.

The council further decided to set aside as a fund to develop this property, the money collected as a tax on punchboards. It has been suggested that all civic organizations cooperate with the veterans' groups and the city in building and maintaining such a community center. The punch board tax is a new tax and so the undertaking will not mean any additional burden on home owners.
