School Tax Vote Called At Silverton

SILVERTON—Faced with the necessity of adding three more teachers and increases in present teachers' salaries, the Silverton school board is setting a special school election, the second in as many years, for the purpose of adding more taxes outside of the six per cent limitation. This was the decision of the board following the preparation of the new budget for 1944-45, just completed. Crowded conditions in the grade school call for the additional teachers, W. R. Tomison, chairman of the board, said. The request will be for \$19,976.28 and the election has been set for March 3 at 8 p.m. Taxes inside the six per cent limitation total \$56,202.84.

It is recalled that last April a special election was held when an additional \$10,957.37 was voted. The 1943-44 tax levies inside the six per cent limitation totaled \$43,528.63. The budget shows total indebtedness of the district at \$97,000 of which \$62,000 is bonded and the \$35,000 in warrant indebtedness. Both have been reduced during the past year, the former by \$1500 and the warrant indebtedness by \$10,000.

Only small increases are noted in the general control, including a small raise in the superintendent's salary, and in the supervisory departments. Estimated teaching expenditures and fuel costs are showing the increases. Total estimated expenditures for the year are placed at \$110,014.62 which includes \$15,350 debt and bond services.

Serving in the budget committee are Earl J. Adams, R. A. Fish, C. A. Hande, Rholin Cooley and G. L. Bridwell. On the school board are W. R. Tomison, J. J. Moe, Arthur Dahl, Lloyd Larsen and T. T. Leonard.

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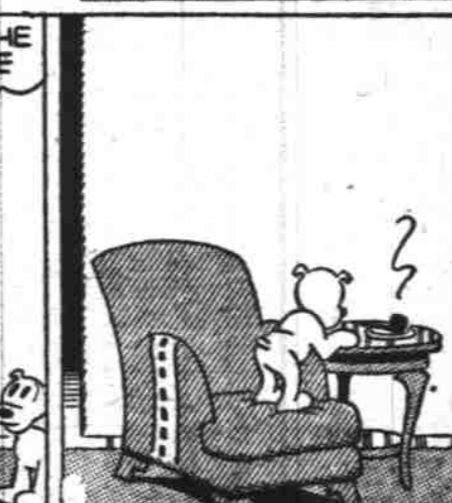
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
