Tax Described

PORTLAND, Feb. 17 (Special)-J. W. Maloney, collector of internal revenue, explained today that taxpayers whose 1944 income was less than \$5000 have a choice of three different ways of filing their 1944 income tax returns. Taxpayers whose income was \$5000 or more must all make "long-form"

The three methods open to persons whose income was under \$5000 are as follows:

1. Fill out the withholding re ceipt, form W-2 (Rev.), received from their employers. 2. Make a "short-form" return

on form 1040. 3. Make a "long-form" return on form 1040.

The easiest way to file is to fill in and mail in a withholding receipt, but this method is permitted only if the taxpayer had less than \$100 not subject to withholding.
