C., his staff will assist the American Red Cross in navy nurse recruitment, and the navy staff will give physical examinations and handle the complete processing of application papers through the Seattle office in Room 301, Exchange building, and through the traveling board procurement headquarters, 426 Park Building, 731 Southwest Alder street, Portland, he said.
