Court Affirms Page Decision

The state supreme court in a decision Tuesday affirmed Judge E. M. Page in the appeal case of D. A. Fish, appellant, vs. C. M. Bishop, trustee of the will of the late C. P. Bishop; and Justice of the Peace Chris J. Kowitz.

The suit arose over a forcible entry and detainer action in which an effort was made to remove Fish from tenancy of property belonging to the Bishop estate. In justice court, Judge Kowitz dismissed the case, as originally brought, after a second suit was instigated in which the question of ownership of the property was not included. Counsel contended a justice of the peace had no authority in the case because of property ownership being involved and therefore had no right to dismiss but rather the action should have been heard in circuit court. It was on this point of contention that the appeal was taken, Judge Page affirming Kowitz and the higher court, in turn, affirming Judge Page.

Olivotti Rites To Be Friday

MT. ANGEL, Feb. 20—Funeral services for Mrs. Maria Olivotti, 91, who died Monday, will be held Friday morning following 8:15 requiem mass.

Mrs. Olivotti was born October 3, 1853 in Venice, Italy and was married there in 1874. Her husband came to Mt. Angel in 1882 and she came six years later. Survivors are three daughters and the widow of her son, Natalia Olivotti, killed in an accident a few years ago.

The daughters are Marina Stufel, Portland; Angela Olivotti, San Francisco, and Anna Olivotti, Mt. Angel; Mrs. Natalia Olivotti lives at Eureka and she and Miss Angela Olivotti are expected to arrive here for the funeral Friday morning.

Agriculture Wants to Be Full Partner With Business, Haag

Declaring that agriculture was the only industry that was prepared for the war the nation is now fighting, Henry Haag, Oregon farmer and head of Dairy Cooperative, Tuesday noon told members of the Salem Kiwanis club "agriculture, in turn, wants to be taken into full partnership with business."

"Agriculture," he said, "is the only industry in the country which has never been able to pay the wages to workers so they could afford new automobiles, now considered a necessary part of the American living standard. This nation has six per cent of the world's land surface, seven per cent of the population, 30 per cent of the railroads, 60 per cent of the phones and 80 per cent of the automobiles."

"On the nation's farms toil 10,500,000 workers, in the nation's manufacturing 11,288,000. Invested in agriculture are \$41,300,000, just six billions less than is invested in manufacturing. Thirty per cent of the manufacturing is processing of farm products. One-third of the wholesale trade is farm products. Seventeen per cent of the gross tonnage on railroads is farm shipping.

"I have lived 55 years on the same Oregon farm. Perhaps the tradition and environment accounts for the way I think. Wallace, the politician, thinks he can create 60,000,000 jobs after the war. Kaiser thinks the country can continue its prosperity if the government loans business men money for operations. They both may be right, have the right so to think and so does Henry Haag.

"We have social legislation which projects programs of staggering sums. Our national debt is greater than that of the rest of the world. There are over 6,000,000 farms in the nation and they are industry's best customer, better than the rest of the world. Be-
