### Added Hitch Voted to State Tax Discount

The house Monday passed bills (HB 259, 260, 261) which provide that in event the voters reject a five-mill, two-year property tax levy, which would be cancelled out of income and excise tax surplus, the \$10,000,000 surplus would not be used for discounts to income taxpavers.

The property tax levy is designated to provide \$4,000,000 for the higher education building program and \$6,000,000 for state institution

buildings. The new bills increase the "cushion" for future property tax relief from \$5,000,000 to \$15,000,-000. Excess income revenues-bethat a five cents a pound tax also be imposed on coffee while Senator W. H. Strayer asked why the cigaret tax should not be broad enough to include all tobaccos.

Sen. Earl T. Newbry said of the cigaret bill that "This is nothing more nor less than a sales tax."

Rep. Robert Bennett of Port land opposed the memorial "in any form" as contrary to democratic principles, and Rep. John Dickson of Portland called such plan "one more step toward tips, Wells said. dictatorship."
























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
