

Keltner Joins Cleveland Nine

Repeats '44 Move, Resigns War Job

LAFAYETTE, Ind., March 14.—(AP)—Ken Keltner again has left a war plant job to play ball with the Cleveland Indians. Although declining comment on his action the perennial third baseman for the American League all-star team repeated his assertion of last year, when he said: "Baseball is my business. If the army wants me, it will find me working at it."

Yesterday President Roosevelt said he favored baseball as long as it did not require perfectly healthy people who could be doing more useful war work. The infielder left a job in a Milwaukee war plant to report to training camp last year. He promptly was reclassified 1-A and was accepted for the navy after passing his physical examination. He was not called, however, and after several months had passed he was given a 2-A classification. Presumably this was changed to 2-B when he returned to his factory job at the close of last year's campaign.

Funk, Cobb and Turner were inherited from the Leslie team, the others are former Pioneers.

Both coaches reveal that the kids from the rival schools are fitting together as playing units much more readily than expected and anticipate putting fairly formidable outfits on the floor for their initial encounters in the Portland tourney. Since the Rose City affair is a single elimination meet, however, the local lads will have at their best for the first start. No playing schedules have been received here to date.

Fifth Patrols Probing Way Into Vergato

ROME, March 14.—(AP)—Strong Fifth army patrols have worked their way north to Vergato, important German stronghold 14 miles southwest of Bologna. Already threatened by Allied forces on the south, east and west, Allied headquarters said today.

Southwest of Vergato, which is astride the main Pistola-Bologna highway, other Fifth army troops have beaten off German counterattacks against newly won positions on the 5900-foot Monte Spigolo.

Field Marshal Albert Kesselring's embattled German forces were displaying increased aggressiveness on the main approaches to Bologna, key Nazi communication and supply center in northern Italy.

Headquarters of the Mediterranean Allied air force disclosed that 2500 tons of supplies had been parachuted to partisan forces behind the German lines in northern Italy in recent weeks.

WASHINGTON, March 14.—(AP) Colleges were credited today with having already cut down on their athletic team travels and with planning even greater wartime reductions. Schedules in all sports are being localized and inter-sectional travel pared to a minimum, said Asa Bushnell, spokesman for eastern colleges.

At the same time, the office of defense transportation disclosed that business men seeking hotel accommodations in Champaign and Urbana, Ill., today complained that facilities there were jammed by high school basketball teams attending tournaments.

No immediate action will be taken in regard to the Illinois events, the ODT said, but added that the whole impact of amateur sports, in particular, on hotel and transportation facilities, is under consideration.
