

Grains Slump At Start But Close Strong

CHICAGO, March 14. —(AP)— Grain markets dipped frequently under the pressure of profit cashing sales today but recovered during the final hour and finished with most prices showing fractional gains.

Wheat was independently strong at times and the nearby contracts reached new seasonal highs. Flour millers were persistent buyers, centering their purchases in the May delivery which was offered in large amounts at \$1.72.

In cash grain markets the shortage of box cars has curtailed receipts and prices are firm at OPA ceilings.

Flour prices have risen about 15 cents per sack since January and the Northwestern Millers, a trade journal, said mills, unable to find adequate shipping facilities, were allocating their product to assure equitable distribution.

Corn was off minor fractions during most of the day but rallied just before the close.

At the finish wheat was 1/4 lower to 3/4 higher than yesterday's close, May \$1.71 1/2-1.72. Corn was up 1/4 to 3/4, May \$1.15 1/2-1/2. Oats were up 1/4 to off 1/4, May 67 1/2-3/4. Rye was 1/4 lower to 1/2 higher, May 1.15 1/2-1.14 1/2. Barley was up 1/4 to 1, May \$1.12 1/4.

Stock Market Moves Slowly Upward Again

NEW YORK, March 14. —(AP)— The stock market again moved on a somewhat subdued note today although enough buying came in to boost a fair number of leaders fractions to around a point.

An advance in steels and rails helped to stiffen the list. In the final hour low priced motors had a spirited move. Many of the closing prices were a bit under the day's highs.

Transactions totaled 750,000 shares, the smallest in about four months, and in line with the volume-shrinkage of recent sessions.

The Associated Press 60-stock composite recorded a closing gain of 2 of a point at 61.2. Giving effect to a rise of nearly 5 points in Atlantic coast line the carrier average rose .6 of a point.

Up a point or better were Studebaker, Eastman Kodak, Philip Morris and Dupont, showing fractional advances were U. S. Steel, Chrysler, Willis-Overland, International Telephone, Santa Fe, Southern Pacific, Great Northern and Erie.
