- Green salad, Tuna fish surprise, Fresh spinach, Peach betty, Spiced cream

TUNA FISH SURPRISE

- 1 cup sifted flour, 1 1/2 teaspoons baking powder, 1/4 teaspoon salt, 1/4 teaspoon curry, 1 egg, 1/2 cup milk, 1 tablespoon melted shortening, 1/2 cup flaked tuna fish, Sift together flour, baking powder, salt and curry. Beat egg and add milk and melted shortening. Add to flour mixture, stirring until flour is moistened. Into four greased three-inch muffin cups put enough batter to fill half of each cup. With spoon, make hollows in center of muffins. Press two tablespoons flaked tuna in each hollow. Cover tuna with remaining muffin batter. Bake at 425 degrees 20 minutes. Serve with:

CREAM SAUCE

- 1/4 cup butter or substitute, 1/4 cup flour, 1 teaspoon salt, 1/4 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce, 2 cups milk, 1 tablespoon chopped parsley. Melt butter. Remove from fire, add flour, salt and pepper and stir to a smooth paste. Return to fire, add Worcestershire sauce and milk and stir until mixture thickens. Add parsley and heat thoroughly.

MEATS, FATS, ETC.: Book 4—Red stamps Q5 through S5 good through March 31. Stamps T5 through X5 good through April 30; Y5 and Z5 and A2 through D2 good through June 2; E2 through J2 good through June 30. PROCESSED FOODS: Book 4—Blue stamps X3 through Z3 and A2 and B2 good through March 31. Stamps C4 through G2 good through April 30; H2 through M2 good through June 2; N2 through S2 good through June 30. SUGAR: Book 4—Stamp 35 valid for five pounds through June 2. Next stamp scheduled to be validated May 1. SHOES: Book 3—Airplane stamps 1, 2 and 3 valid indefinitely. OPA says no plans to cancel any. GASOLINE: All coupons good everywhere for four gallons each through March 31. A 15 coupons good everywhere for four gallons each through June 21. PERIODICALS: Period 1-3 (incl) coupons valid through August 31. Not more than 75 per cent of season's rations should have been used to date.
