Funeral services for Truman E. Waldorf, resident of Salem since 1911, who died at his home, 1125 North 16th st., Thursday, will be held from the W. T. Rigdon chapel Saturday at 1:30 p. m. Concluding services will be held in City View cemetery.

Waldorf was born in Beetown, Wis., Feb. 23, 1857, and in 1883 moved to North Dakota where he operated a farm until he came to Salem. He married Hannah Peterson in 1891 at Bismark, ND, and in 1941 the couple celebrated their golden wedding anniversary here.

Surviving are the widow and seven children, Mrs. Clara Groh and Mrs. Bertha Elwell both of Portland; Mrs. Marie Eggstaff, Mrs. Edna Cleveland, Mrs. Emma Pearce and Arthur Waldorf, all of Salem; and Grant Waldorf of Camas, Wash., and eight grandchildren. Another son, Francis M. Waldorf, died in 1940 as a result of injuries received in an automobile accident.

After going over various cost figures, it was decided to ask for a minimum price to the grower of \$61.40 per ton, plus a margin for other incidentals. Last year's reflected price was \$55.
