1 cup pecan meats, sliced.

Line 9-inch pie plate with pastry. Cream butter and sugar. Add eggs, molasses and lemon juice and beat with rotary egg beaten.

Add pecan meats and pour into pastry-lined pie plate. Bake in hot oven (450 degrees) 10 minutes, then decrease heat to moderate (350 degrees) and bake 30 minutes longer.
