Molasses will take the place of part of the sugar in the pie that's on today's dinner menu.

Head lettuce chunks
Meat pie with vegetables
Mashed potato top
Escalloped tomatoes
Pecan pie

PECAN PIE
1/4 cup butter
3/4 cup granulated sugar
3 eggs, unbeaten
3/4 cup New Orleans molasses
Juice of 1 lemon
1 cup pecan meats, sliced.
Line 9-inch pie plate with pastry. Cream butter and sugar. Add eggs, molasses and lemon juice and beat with rotary egg beater. Add pecan meats and pour into pastry-lined pie plate. Bake in hot oven (450 degrees) 10 minutes, then decrease heat to moderate (350 degrees) and bake 30 minutes longer.
