**Bees Must Be Registered**—Aplary registrations are due April 1, the state department of agriculture reminded beekeepers this week. Although application blanks have been mailed to all operators of apiaries registered last year, persons who have commenced to keep bees since last spring, whether a colony or many, should secure blanks and register their hives, it was said. The minimum registration fee is \$1 which covers from one to 10 hives; with a 10-cent charge for every hive over 10 up to 100 and 5 cents for each hive above 100. The money is for inspection costs and disease control.

Madison Lafayette Jones, who developed the Lake Labish celery acreages on swamp and lake land which was part of his family's homestead, celebrated his 96th birthday with a family party Thursday. A visitor here early this week with families of his sons, Ronald Jones and Ellis Jones, he now makes his home in Portland with daughters, Mabel Cannon and Ilda Withycombe.

Born March 29, 1849, at Kokomo, Ind., he came to Oregon in 1853 with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. S. W. R. Jones, who settled between Brooks and Gervais there to rear their 15 sons and daughters. The 96-year-old Jones, a graduate of Willamette university with the class of 1871, resided in this area until 1941. He was appointed to the state fair board by Governor Withycombe and served on it for a number of years.

One sister, Sarah Parker, makes her home in Portland. In addition to the sons in Salem and the daughters in Portland, he has a daughter, Mrs. Claire Gray, in Long Beach, Calif.

The family home and \$50,000 cash were bequeathed to the widow, Myrtle B. Smith, who was named executrix of the will, admitted to probate in circuit court today. Other bequests were made to friends.

One of seven equal shares of the residue will go to Willamette university, one to the church, and the other five to relatives.

## Salem FFAs Win Honors At Portland

**PORTLAND**, March 29—(AP)—The Future Farmers of America were told today that tomorrow's rancher will be more interested in the use of crops in industry than for food.

"Human economy is going to return more and more to an agricultural basis," Dean Collins, Journal garden editor, told the 17th annual FFA convention. "Fuels and oils will not be mined in the future, but converted from farm products."

Sixteen of the state's 41 chapters received the Keystone chapter award for activities during the last year. The chapters: Albany, Baker, Canby, Corvallis, Dayton, Enterprise, Forest Grove, McLoughlin, Milwaukie, Molalla, Myrtle Point, Rainier, Salem, Scappoose, Silverton and Wal-lowa.

## Dimout Exemption Extension Asked

**PORTLAND**, March 29—(Special)—The Bonneville administration has requested the office of war utilities to extend the Pacific Northwest's exemption from the WPB dimout order through October, 1945. Present exemption from the order extends through July.

Request for the three-month extension is based on a review of Pacific Northwest power loads and resources which indicates that the Bonneville-Grand Coulee power system will have sufficient surplus energy available under critical water conditions, after meeting its own loads, to carry the deficiencies of other utilities in the region for the period extending through October.
