New Yorker Interested In Youth

Plans for "full employment" after the war include returning servicemen, war workers and women-but leave young people entirely out of the picture, said Mrs. Helen S. Wilbur, staff member of the National board of the Young Women's Christian association who is in Salem for conferences.

Mrs. Wilbur is here in the specific interests of Girl Reserves, and is observing trends in thought across the continent. She is talking with thinking young girls, and will take back to the head office, ideas to be used later as a basis for leadership and training material.

Too few adults are taking an interest in vocational guidance for adolescents, believes Mrs. Wilbur. It is the social agencies, schools and parents who will have to cooperate in figuring out a program for the youth immediately following the war.

When asked if the northwest behind in considering the future of its youth, Mrs. Wilbur reluctantly admitted that it seems to be. Little is being done toward planning for those young people, she said, who have been drawing large wartime wages, and will be the first to be discharged when servicemen return in numbers.

Speaking of opportunities for girls, Mrs. Wilbur said that here -is a great future in such agencies as the YMCA, for girls who are interested in dealing with youth. Young persons can direct leadership groups, teach crafts and other skills as beginning training for the future.

Mrs. Wilbur has been in the northwest since the first of February and is obtaining an overall picture of youth in this part of the country.

She has met with various adult committees and youth groups during the past two days in the local YWCA.

. . . FISH LOAF

2 cups flaked cooked or can-

ned fish 2 cups mashed potatoes

1 tablespoon lemon juice 11/2 teaspoons salt 1/8 teaspoon pepper 1 cup evaporated milk

Beat egg. Stir in fish, potatoes, lemon juice, salt and pepper. Add sufficient milk to bind mixture and moisten well. If fish and potatoes are very moist, less milk will be needed. Pour into a greased loaf pan. Bake in a hot over (425 degrees) until brown, about 30 minutes. Serve plain or with egg sauce. Yield: 6 servings.

EGG SAUCE 2 tablespoons flour

1 cup water, broth or vegetable liquid 1 cup evaporated milk

. . .

1/2 teaspoon salt Dash of pepper

Stir water slowly into flour to keep smooth. Bring mixture to a boil, stirring constantly to prevent lumping. Add milk and seasonings, set over boiling water and continue cooking until for fish, fowl, meats thickened, stirring occasionally. and economy meals
