Farmers Told To Give Help Suitable Deal

"With the manpower shortage more pronounced than ever before and with the heavy demand period on the horizon users of emergency farm labor should take every precaution to see that workers get the best possible deal in order to keep them on the farms," Ralph Laird, emergency farm labor assistant said Saturday.

"Marion county farmers demonstrated last year that they knew the difficulties to be overcome and are making a start in the right direction this year," he said. "Most big users of labor are providing their own transportation, realizing that the old cars of the transients have gone to the junk yards.

"We must realize that most of the emergency farm laborers are not hardened to farm work this early in the year. They should be broken in gradually. The volunteer wants to help produce food or he wouldn't have applied for work. He is willing to learn and expects to be taught. "If he is gradually broken into his new work, given fair food and the prevailing pay for his particular work he will stick to one job until it is done. Many of these workers are far from home and any personal interest shown him, looking to his comfort and health is likely to reap a harvest for the employer. We must remember that these volunteer workers are patriots engaged in an essential industry second only to tating a gun against the enemy. Without food we will lose the war."

State Funds Set At \$46,294,030 As of March 31

Various funds of the state total \$46,294,030 as of March 31, exclusive of \$64,822,000 in the unemployment compensation trust

account but including \$26,247,739 in the general fund, State Treasurer Leslie Scott reported Saturday. Bond investments totalled \$36,160,185.

In the \$46,294,030 were included \$9,878,457 for the highway commission, \$2,502,009 in the state school support fund, \$2,312,860 in the industrial accident commission fund, \$1,875,429 under the

board of higher education, and \$1,128,422 in the account of the veterans' state aid commission, as well as many smaller items.
