### John D. Cannon Wins Advance to First Lieutenant

WITH THE SIXTH INFANTRY DIVISION ON LUZON—John D. Cannon, son of Mr. and Mrs. Owen A. Cannon, of 1196 Marion st., Salem, Ore., has been promoted from second to first lieutenant as a rifle platoon leader in the 20th infantry regiment of the sixth infantry division.

Before coming to Luzon, Cannon, who received his commission from the infantry officer candidate school in Australia in September, 1944, was stationed in New Guinea where he participated in the Sansapor campaign.

Before entering the service, Cannon was a student at Oregon College of Education at Monmouth.

### No Doubt in Mind of Turner Seamen That 'Penny' Still Afloat

ABOARD THE USS PENNSYLVANIA SOMEWHERE IN THE PACIFIC—Although Radio Tokyo has reported her sunk several times, the USS Pennsylvania is still very much afloat, as members of her crew, including Richard I. Burch, S 1/c, USNR, son of Mrs. Harvey L. Burch, Turner, Ore., will testify.

The first public announcement of her record in the Pacific, made recently at advance Pacific fleet headquarters, tells of her participation in 13 amphibious operations and of her part in the defeat of the large Japanese naval force in the battle for Leyte gulf on October 24 and 25, 1944.

### Lt. R. V. Bassien Gets Bronze Star Medal for Valor

MONMOUTH—Second Lt. Richard V. Bassien jr., has been awarded the bronze star medal for courageous and intelligent service in action in Germany. Lieutenant Bassien, a member of a field artillery squadron, maintained a listening post by night and observation post by day while his squadron was holding a thin line in the vicinity of Borg, between Dec. 24 and 31, 1944. His citation states that his performance was marked by outstanding bravery, perseverance, skill and devotion to duty, reflecting credit upon himself and the United States army.

Bassien, who was graduated from Monmouth high school in 1938, and attended Oregon College of Education, made his home here with friends, Mr. and Mrs. W. R. Graham and Mr. and Mrs. Charles Calbreath. In his most recent letter home he stated that due to foot troubles he was assigned to observation work exclusively for a time.

### Medal Awarded Everett Joeckel For Heroism

The navy and marine corps medal for heroism in action against Japanese forces on Saipan last July 7 has been awarded Everett M. Joeckel, pharmacist's mate 1/c, by Capt. Paul W. Wilson, commanding the U.S. naval hospital at Corvallis. The presentation was in the name of President Roosevelt.

Joeckel, who now is on duty at the Corvallis hospital, is a graduate of the Gaston, Ore., high school and formerly was employed in Salem. He was overseas 24 months with the 2nd marine division.

His citation said that, in aiding in the evacuation of wounded men in the battle area of Saipan, Joeckel "repeatedly, with complete devotion to duty, crossed and recrossed terrain which was being swept by intense machine gun, rifle and mortar fire."

WITH THE FIFTH ARMY, Italy—Cpl. Albert Herfeldt, gunner, brother of Mrs. Mary L.

Blanche of 10 E. Turner road, Salem, Ore., is a member of the 805th tank destroyer battalion, which has fought throughout the past winter as artillery, from a ridge overlooking the Po Valley in Italy. The 805th's isolated positions on the Fifth army front are accessible only by pack mule and in contact with the rear by radio alone. The outfit has more than 30 months' service overseas and more than 400 days in combat to its credit.

### Capt. Robert Norris Wins Bronze Star

WITH UNITED STATES ORDINANCE FORCES IN EUROPE—Capt. Robert W. Norris, jr., formerly of 265 N. 23rd St., Salem, Ore., was recently awarded the bronze star medal for operations against the enemy while he was commanding officer of the 3482nd ordnance medium automotive maintenance company.

### PFC C. C. Cornelius With Field Artillery Battalion in Germany

6TH ARMY GROUP, Germany. The 105-mm. howitzers of the 693rd field artillery battalion, paving the way for U.S. Seventh army doughboys through heavily-fortified mountains of northern Alsace, recently threw their 57,000th shell at the Germans. The battalion includes PFC Carlton C. Cornelius of 460 N. 13th, Salem, Ore.

Part of a chain of corps artillery units supporting Gen. Jacob L. Devers' 6th army group, the 693rd

has seen a variety of combat during its 222 consecutive days in the line. But the main mission of its 105-mm. howitzers, which can hurl a 35-pound projectile 10,300 yards with accuracy, has been close-in infantry support.
