

Russia Sends Pleasure Ship To Conference

SAN FRANCISCO, April 20—(AP)—Russia has sent to San Francisco an entertainment ship well loaded with a cargo of caviar, vodka and other makings of many gay Soviet parties during the United Nations conference.

It seems certain that the Russian delegation, despite the reserved face it is expected to turn to the public, will set the entertainment pace for the party, which opens next Wednesday.

Fifty members of the Russian group arrived last night in three airplanes. They are among the first to get here in force except for experts and aides of the United States delegation. Other groups poured into the city today and the inflow is due to reach full volume by Sunday night.

Approximately 5000 persons are expected for the conference. This means a jammed city despite the steps taken to keep non-conference visitors out of town. At the moment there is plenty of food and drink. Cigarettes are available to a hotel patron who shows his room key at the newstand in the lobby.

Also at the moment there are more empty hotel rooms in San Francisco than since the war began. All reservations except for the conference were cut out April 15 and people who had no urgent business here were told to stay away. This has worked so well that one tavern keeper complained today his business is off 20 per cent.

Police made pre-conference raids to reduce crooks' activities. The ship which Moscow sent to the city is the 2153-ton Smolny, built at Leningrad in 1929. It has capacity for 138 passengers, including 28 first class. There were reports, now denied, that it was to have been used as delegation headquarters.

Under leadership of Foreign Commissar Molotov, on whom much of the success of the conference depends, the Russians will live at one of this wealthy city's finest hotels.

Decision Due On Klamath Navy Center

WASHINGTON, April 20—(AP)—Members of the Oregon congressional delegation said tonight they expect an early decision on a proposal to establish a naval rehabilitation center at Klamath Falls, Ore.

Referring to the site plans, Rep. Stockman (R-Ore) said the argument is "hot." "There are two other places besides Klamath Falls under consideration," he reported.

An aide to Senator Cordon (R-Ore) said the proposal has been under almost continuous discussion for some time.

The center would be of temporary construction, for treatment of servicemen with malaria and filariasis, similar to the marine hospital now in Klamath Falls. Land acquisition of 300 acres is contemplated.

Funds for the structure are contained in an omnibus public works appropriation for the navy which passed the house this week. During hearings on the bill, Commander C. H. Crichton told the house appropriations committee that the proposed new plant, if established at Klamath Falls, would cost \$3,367,000.

New Berry Ceiling Will Equalize Prices
PORTLAND, April 20—(AP)—A regional OPA official told farmers today a new price ceiling on berries would equalize producer prices and hinted ration points might be removed from mutton during the lambing season.

Verne Livesay, OPA agriculture relations advisor, said complaints of Washington-Oregon berry growers were recognized in the new price ceiling, to be announced before the harvest.
