Special Farm Jobs Await Boys, 14-18

High school boys, 14 to 18 years of age, are wanted by the emergency farm labor office for all-summer jobs in Marion county and application may now be made for these special assignments.

Ralph P. Laird, farm labor assistant, said Friday following conferences with Frank B. Bennett, superintendent of Salem schools, Harry Johnson, principal of Salem high school, and Russell Adams, assistant state supervisor of emergency farm labor, of Corvallis.

Adams, who makes frequent trips to Marion, is in charge of youth in the farm labor setup. He said boys wishing to undertake this special work must be of a high type, have the recommenda-

tion of their high school principal, the county agent or Laird.

Boys with past farm experience can be placed directly in some of the better full time jobs without further training. A few of the boys selected for this work, Adams explained, will be given a week of tryout and training at Oregon State college, with all expenses paid. They will be tested as to their knowledge of livestock, general farming, tractors and trucks.

The farms on which these specially-selected boys will be placed will also be selected farms where modern methods and intensive programs are being projected. Five areas were visited for the purpose of determining the farms on which the selected group of laborers would be placed.
