CHICAGO, May 7-(AP)-Profitcashing stalled grain markets for a time after a strong beginning today but a flurry of last-minute short covering caused a sharp rally in both wheat and rye.

At the finish May rye traded at \$1.40, a new high since April, 1928, and wheat was on the strong side with the September and December deliveries up more than a 000.00. cent.






