Motor Vehicle Registration Takes Jump

Motor vehicle registration during the first four months of 1945 showed an increase of 2594 over that for the same period of 1944, Secretary of State Robert S. Farrell, jr., reported here Monday.

There were 393,085 vehicles registered in Oregon at the end of April this year compared to 389,491 last year. Of the total, 313,558 were private passenger vehicles, 1095 busses, 33,372 light trucks and 41,869 heavy trucks.

Official cars and motorcycles made up the remainder of the registration.

Private passenger cars account for 80 per cent of the total motor vehicle registration in Oregon, Farrell said.

Registration fees for the first four months of the year aggregated \$3,054,384.45 compared to \$2,953,484.69 a year ago.
