



2 tablespoons vinegar 1/2 teaspoon salt Few grains cayenne

1/2 cup evaporated milk Use fresh horseradish if it is obtainable, otherwise the bottled kind will do. Mix it with salt, vinegar and cayenne and stir in evaporated milk beaten stiff.

Glazed Rhubarb 1 Dound rhubard, cut in 1-incl pieces (about 4 cups) 1/2 cup sugar.

2 tablespoons enriched flour % cup corn syrup Place rhubarb in four individual casseroles. Mix sugar and flour. Add syrup and mix well.

Pour over rhubard. Scone Turn-About 1 cup sifted enriched flour 11/2 teaspoons baking powder

1/2 teaspoon salt 2 tablespoons shortening 1/4 cup milk

1 tablespoon corn syrup 1/2 teaspoon lemon extract 1 egg, beaten

Sift together flour, baking lemon extract to egg. Add all to flour mixture, stirring only enough to moisten flour. Drop dough by teaspoonfuls on rhuaround edge of dish. Bake in moderately hot oven (400 degrees Farhenheit) about 20 minutes. Yield: four glazed rhubarb turn-abouts.
