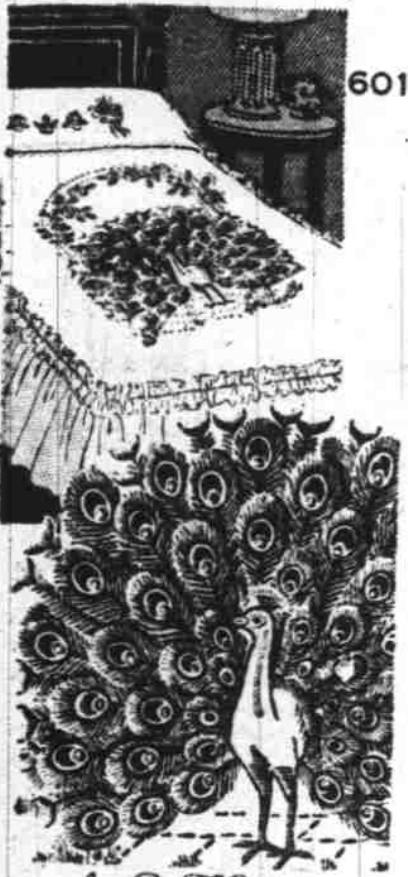
Ministers' Wives Elect Officers

EGGS SUPREME
3 tablespoons butter or substitute
4 tablespoons flour
2 tablespoons catsup
2 cups milk
6 hard cooked eggs.
Salt and pepper
4 to 6 shredded wheat biscuits
Parsley
Melt butter; blend in flour and catsup. Gradually add milk; cook over low heat, stirring constantly, until thickened. Cut eggs in halves lengthwise. Remove yolks. Cut egg whites in slivers; add to sauce. Season with salt and pepper. Split shredded wheat biscuits and heat about 10 minutes in a moderate oven (350 degrees). Arrange shredded wheat biscuits on serving platter; cover with egg whites in sauce and sprinkle with egg yolks which have been pressed through a sieve. Garnish with parsley. Yield: 4 to 6 servings.

Book 4—Y5 and Z5 through D2 good through June 2; E2 through J2 good through June 30; K2 through F2 good through July 31; G2 through U2 good through August 31.
SUGAR:
Book 4—H2 through M2 good through June 2; N2 through S2 good through June 30; T2 through X2 good through July 31; Y2, Z2 and A1 through C1 good through August 31.
GRAIN:
Book 4—Stamp 25 valid for five pounds through June 1. Stamp 26 good through June 30.
SHOES:
Book 2—Alplane stamps 1, 2 and 3 valid indefinitely.
GASOLINE:
A 15 coupons good everywhere for four gallons each through June 21.
FUEL OIL:
Period 1-3 (incl) coupons valid through August 31. Not more than 70 per cent of season's rations should have been used to date.
