MEATS, FATS, ETC.: Book 4—Y3 and Z3 through D2 good through June 2; Z2 through Z1 good through June 26; Z3 through Z2 good through July 31; Z3 through U3 good through August 31.

PROCESSED FOODS: Book 4—B2 through M2 good through June 2; N2 through S2 good through June 26; T2 through X2 good through July 31; Y2 and A1 through C1 good through August 31.

SEGAR: Book 4 — Stamp 33 valid for five pounds through June 2. Stamp 36 now valid.

SHOES: Book 3—Airplane stamps 1, 2 and 3 valid indefinitely.

GASOLINE: 15 coupons good everywhere for four gallons each through June 31.

FUEL OIL: Period 1-3 (incl) coupons valid through August 31. Not more than 75 per cent of season's rations should have been used to date.
