

# Louis Magin Killed in Germany

First Lt. Louis H. Magin, who as a student at Willamette university, 1931-35, and an employe of the Montgomery Ward store here and made many friends in Salem, was killed in action April 7 in Germany.

Word of Magin's death came to Salem this week from Amityville, N.Y., where his parents, the Rev. and Mrs. Louis Magin, and his brother, Robert, also a former Willamette university student, reside. While the Rev. Mr. Magin served as Methodist church district superintendent, the family made its home here.

Louis Hughes Magin was born in Minneapolis, June 27, 1913. He entered Willamette university in 1931 and for two years was a regularly enrolled student here. The last two years of his residence in Salem, he was a special student at the university while working downtown.

Magin was business manager of the Collegian, student weekly newspaper, one year at Willamette and was a member of the university Philharmonic choir which represented Oregon at the Chicago Century of Progress exposition in Chicago in 1933. Leaving Willamette, he entered Massachusetts institute of Technology, from which he was graduated in 1936 with a bachelor's degree in science. While completing his senior year, he served as director of boys' work in Madison Square Church House, New York. In 1937, with his brother, he traveled by motorcycle through Europe, visiting 12 countries in the continent, and in 1939 he became sales manager for the American Furniture company in New York. He entered the service December 14, 1942, went overseas last November and was with the Seventh army when he was killed in April.

The lieutenant, who was graduated from Salem high and attended Willamette and the University of Oregon, was commanding company B of the 30th infantry. The wound was his second.
