**SMOKED SAUSAGE WITH FIVE-MINUTE CABBAGE**  
1 1/2 pounds smoked sausage links  
Water  
New cabbage  
Salt and paprika.

Put sausage in kettle or frying pan, add about 1/4 cup water. Cover and simmer 30 minutes over low heat.

Remove outer leaves of cabbage, quarter, and cut out the tough core. Shred or chop it and drop into small amount of rapidly boiling water. Cook just until tender (5 to 8 minutes). Drain well. Season, add butter or margarine if desired. Place in center of hot plate and surround with cooked sausages. Serve immediately.

The bride is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Edward Burnham, 1695 Lee street, Salem. She attended the University of California and was employed in San Francisco before entering the WAC in April, 1943. Since her arrival overseas last December she has been in service in New Guinea, Leyte and Manila. The groom, son of Mrs. Andrew Bayner of Trenton, New Jersey, is a former student at Dartmouth college.

Father Sullivan of the army corps of chaplains performed the ceremony, while sunlight filtered through the pale blue windows at the rear of the candle-lighted altar. 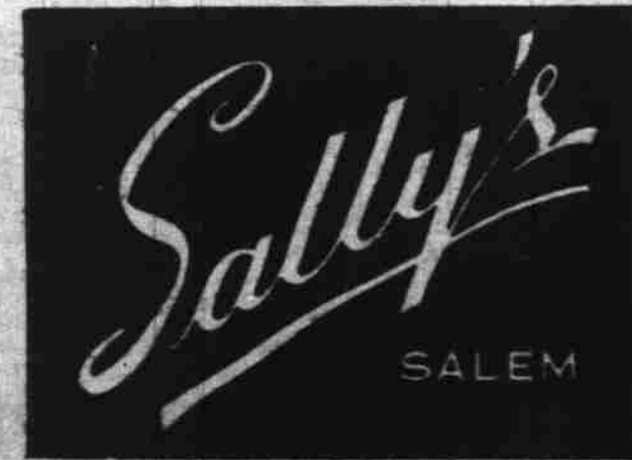
