Homemakers who have been worried about the high point values of fruits, vegetables and meats may obtain useful information about preparing for food for the frozen food locker at a meeting Tuesday, 8:30, at the chamber of commerce.

Professor Thomas Onsdorff of the food industries department at Oregon State college, will speak about the freezing problems of the homemaker. Hunters and fishermen and others interested in preserving food by the frozen locker method are invited.

Dr. Onsdorff will have samples of frozen foods to display and will analyze food brought in. Dr. Onsdorff held a meeting here three years ago, where much valuable information was obtained.

Built-in home freezing units and future trends in freezing will be discussed and questions will be answered.

- 2 cups tomato sauce
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 cup grated American cheese
- Cut olives from pits in large slices. Fry ground steak; combine with noodles, tomato sauce, salt, and olives and blend thoroughly. Pour into shallow baking dish and sprinkle top with cheese. Bake in moderate oven (350 degrees F.) about 15 minutes. Serves 6 to 8.

Book 4—Ys and Zs through D2 good through June 2; H2 through J2 good through June 30; K2 through P2 good through July 31; Q2 through U2 good through August 31.
FROZEN FOODS
Book 4—H2 through M2 good through June 2; N2 through S2 good through June 26; T2 through X2 good through July 31; Y2, Z2 and A1 through C1 good through August 31.
SUGAR:
Book 4—Stamp 38 valid for five pounds through June 2. Stamp 39 now valid.
STAMP:
Book 2—Aeroplane stamps 1, 2 and 3 valid indefinitely.
GASOLINE:
A 15 coupons good everywhere for four gallons each through June 31.
FUEL OIL:
Period 1-3 (incl) coupons valid through August 31. Not more than 75 per cent of season's rations should have been used to date.
