Diversification Big Factor in Farm Income

"Diversification of crops in Marion county is being counted on to maintain the farm income, which has increased from around \$9,000,000 in the period between 1928 and 1936, and the \$17,000,000 yielded in 1942," W. G. (Jerry) Nibler, county agent, told members of the Salem Board of Realtors at their noonday meeting on Friday in Hotel Marion.
"Fertilizer is one of the big answers to continuance of paying crops," the speaker said, "and farmers are learning the time, the place and the quantity to be used. Flax is forging to the front as a crop here, and we must eliminate weeds and produce this crop economically if we are to compete with the foreign product."
"I think we fail to realize how much pasture we have in this county. With the county ranking high in dairy cows, pasture is a major crop. We are gradually taking a high place in the production of beef seed. The dry summer climate is conducive to a good and a plentiful crop."
"Turkeys have become a good proposition for farmers. When large numbers of growers began holding over large breeding flocks it was a question what would hap-

pen to the increased egg yield. That has been solved through the markets in the states having colder climates and severe winters. Growers in Minnesota and Pennsylvania have learned they can buy their eggs here and dispense in the main with large breeding flocks. Our mild winters give growers in this industry an edge.
"While we have always thought of bears when thinking of major vegetable crops, sweet corn now is coming to the fore. We have over 1000 acres in sweet corn this year. Mint is another crop, listed as new, which is gaining. With the supply shut off from China, it is in great demand. Also where mint used to be used chiefly for flavoring, today it is widely used in medication."
