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Court Hears Arguments in Fehl Suit

Arguments of attorneys were heard in the state supreme court here Friday in the suit of Earl H. Fehl, to recover \$11,000, alleged to be due from Jackson county for salary as county judge during the period January 1, 1933, to December 31, 1938. The suit was appealed from Jackson county where Judge H. K. Hanna held for the county. Records show that in August, 1933, Fehl was convicted of ballot theft in Jackson county and later served a term in the state penitentiary. He subsequently was declared insane in Jackson county and received treatments at the Oregon state hospital. Following his release Fehl said he demanded possession of the office but was refused. Fehl charged that he was not removed from the office nor did he resign.

Grover Price for Early Onions Boosted

WASHINGTON, June 1 (AP)—The OPA today increased the grover price for early onions by 15 cents per 50 pounds. The increase will remain in effect until June 20. As a result, the retail ceiling price of early onions will be increased about one-half cent a pound at retail.

Top Cow at Jersey Sale Brings \$1450

SILVERTON—Norman Nash of Salem and A. W. Sweet of Sixes, who are forming a new Jersey partnership at Sixes, purchased the four top cows at the John Koppin Jersey sale held at Gaston on May 30. M. G. Gunderson of Silverton was sales manager. Going to Nash & Sweet was Standard Cartagena Topay, top sales cow at \$1450. Mrs. W. E. Bliss of Vancouver had come to the sale, she reported, expressly to purchase the top cow and stopped at \$1425. Also going to Nash & Sweet were Standard Karna's Pride at \$1100; Standard's Jessie Acres at \$1025 and Standard Fauvic Patsy at \$1000. In all, Nash & Sweet paid \$9070 for 16 cows at the sale. Twenty-one buyers at the sale one daughters of Standard Dandy paid \$20,130 for 42 head. Twenty-Sultan sold for an average of \$578. Col. J. W. Hughes of Forest Grove cried the auction, assisted by A. Malar of Sandy. This was one of the top Jersey sales in Oregon since the boom days of the twenties.

Rex Putnam, state superintendent of public instruction, will be awarded an honorary degree by Lewis and Clark college at commencement exercises Sunday at 5 p.m. Colton Meek, principal of Grant high school and trustee of the college, will present Putnam for the degree of doctor of laws, which will be conferred by Dr. Morgan S. Odell, president, assisted by Harry W. Bruck, chairman of the board of trustees, and Dr. Charles W. Howard, dean of the faculty. State superintendent since 1937, Putnam has done most of his school work in Oregon, coming first to Salem as a high school teacher in 1916. His B.A. and M.A. degrees are from the University of Oregon, and he has also done graduate work at the University of California in Berkeley. Putnam was born in South Dakota in 1890, member of a large family, several of which are now in Oregon. A brother, the Rev. R. L. New Zealand Reduces Butter, Meat Rations

WELLINGTON, June 1 (AP)—New Zealand's minister of supply, D. G. Sullivan, today announced reductions in butter and meat rations, effective June 11, in order that export contributions to Britain and liberated Europe may be increased. The standard butter ration will be cut from eight to six ounces a week and the meat ration by three pence worth weekly.
