German Cities Are Pictured As 'a Mess'

JEFFERSON - (Special) - Cpl. Lloyd Grim, son of Mr. and Mrs. Earl Grim of Jefferson, had "never seen so many happy GIs" in his life as on V-E day, he wrote his parents here.

The corporal, a clerk of supply in a fighter squadron, took his first airplane trip over Germany the day that nation surrendered.

He described such cities as Aachen, Cologne, Dusseldorf, Duessberg and Bonn as "a mess"; said, "I don't think there was a building left standing in Cologne," and declared Aachen was not as

large as he had thought-"I'd say about half as big as Salem."

"It was hard to realize" that large scale battles were raging but a few weeks before in the parts of Germany where "the fields looked so peaceful and quiet with the cows and sheep feeding on the grass as if nothing had disturbed them. It all seemed like a dream, a fairy tale that couldn't be true. But from the looks of the casualty lists, it must be true."

Corporal Grim described France as "the prettiest country of them all" - including Belgium, Germany and England-that he saw on the flight, although "Germany was the most modern with big super highways" where "the only vehicles on the roads were GI

The corporal has been in England more than 15 months.

ABOARD THE U.S. DESTROY-ER ESCORT EDMONDS (Delayed)-James H. McEwen, gunner's mate third class, USNR, son of Mr. and Mrs. Roy P. McEwen, 806 South Water st., Silverton, Ore., served aboard this ship while she fought heavy seas and enemy aircraft to rescue some 375 survivors from a stricken escort carrier which had been hit during an air attack.

The U. S. S. Edmonds was one of four vessels assigned to the rescue mission. The enemy continued air attacks in the early stages of the rescue already hampered by darkness and rough seas. Time after time Lt. Cmdr. John


S. Burrows, jr., 33, USNR, commanding officer of the Edmonds, maneuvered his ship upwind and permitted it to drift slowly toward the largest concentration of survivors, who climbed aboard on life lines, ladders, cargo and float-

At least half the crew of the Edmonds voluntarily entered the water at one time or another to lend a hand to exhausted survivors. The ship's motor whaleboat carried many of the carrier's crew. Every member of the Edmonds crew that night turned his bunk over to one of the survivors. who were safely transferred to a transport next day. He attended Silverton high


