WASHINGTON, June 13—(AP)—Lend-lease aid to China in April was more than 15 times that of the same month a year ago, it was announced.

Foreign economic administrator Leo T. Crowley said in a statement that April's \$61,000,000 worth of materials and services brought the total lend-lease assistance to China since March, 1941, to \$458,874,000.
