### Oregon Black Market Eyed

PORTLAND, June 14.—(AP)—Oregon's black market operators will be hunted by internal revenue agents for failing to list illegal transactions on income tax reports, J. W. Maloney, collector of internal revenue, said today.

The drive will especially concentrate on the black market in meat, he said. Farmers suspected of ceiling price violations will be investigated to find out whether their tax declaration was too low for their income.

Maloney reported some violations already uncovered. The campaign fits into a national drive against income tax violators, recently announced by the treasury department.

### Tooth Decay Survey Slated

CORVALLIS, June 14.—(AP)—A survey to determine cause of the unusually high rate of tooth decay among Oregon residents will begin here next fall.

The research by Oregon State college technicians will attempt to find out whether cause can be attributed to food or the water supply, Dr. Clara A. Stovrick, former University of Washington staff scientist, reported.

A \$20,000 fund provided by the state legislature will finance the laboratory work.
