### Today's Menu

Halibut or sole will make the main dish for today, when served in this menu:  
Grapefruit salad  
Fish Mornay  
Buttered asparagus  
New potatoes  
Strawberry shortcake

**FISH MORNAY**  
4 filets of halibut, flounder, or sole (1 1/4 pounds)  
Salt and pepper  
3 tablespoons butter or substitute  
1 1/2 tablespoons flour  
1/2 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce  
1/4 teaspoon dry mustard  
1 teaspoon garlic vinegar  
1/2 pint cream  
1/2 cup diced cheese

Place filets in individual greased baking dishes or a large baking dish and sprinkle with salt and pepper. Melt butter in saucepan. Remove from fire and add flour, mixing to a smooth paste. Add mustard, Worcestershire sauce and vinegar and stir thoroughly. Return to flame and add cream, stirring constantly until sauce has thickened. Add cheese and cook over low flame until cheese has melted. Pour sauce over fish. Place in 400 degree oven and bake until top is brown (approximately 15 minutes).

**PROCESSED FOODS:**  
Book 4-22 through 32 good through June 30; 33 through 34 good through July 31; 35 through 36 good through August 31; 37 through 38 good through Sept. 30.  
**SUGAR:**  
Book 4-1 - Stamp 25 valid for five pounds through June 1. Stamp 26 now valid.  
**SHOES:**  
Book 3-Airplane stamps 1, 2 and 3 valid indefinitely. New stamp due August 1.  
**GASOLINE:**  
A 15 coupons good everywhere for four gallons each through June 31.  
**FUEL OIL:**  
Period 1-3 (incl) coupons valid through August 31. Not more than 75 per cent of season's rations should have been used to date.
