All Processed Cherries Go To Government

PORTLAND, Ore., June 21—(AP)—Effective yesterday, the war food administration will require that 100 per cent of all hot packed and frozen cherries processed this year be held for the government, officials announced today.

The order, resulting from below average prospects for the 1945 red sour cherry crop, also restricts commercial processing of the cherries to hot packing and freezing, said P. Dean Anderson, WFA fruit and vegetable branch marketing programs representative.

Processors may freeze only 25 per cent of the cherries frozen last year, and each frozen package must weigh 30 pounds or more, Anderson reported.

Those Who Paid Too Much Tax Get Refunds

PORTLAND, June 21—(AP)—The bureau of internal revenue here is mailing out 4500 checks a day to Oregonians who paid too much on their 1944 federal income tax. The bureau said all refunds would be made by September 28.
